All proposals received by 4:00 PM (CST) on April 19, 2019 will be given consideration for an interview. The Bismarck-Mandan MPO reserves the right to limit the interviews to a maximum of five (5) firms whose proposals most clearly meet the RFP requirements. Firms will be notified in writing or by phone of shortlist results. Successful candidates will receive date, time and location information for the interviews.

It is the responsibility of the consultant to ensure all required elements of the proposal are submitted. Proposals missing required elements will be rejected and consultants will be denied interviews.

Minority, women-owned, and disadvantaged business enterprises are encouraged to participate. Respondents must submit four (4) physical copies of the proposal and one (1) electronic copy of the proposal. The full length of the proposal shall be no more than eight (8) pages, but preferably printed as double sided. Appendix material may be supplied in addition to the eight (8) pages of the body. Submittals must be received no later than 4:00 PM (CST) April 19, 2019 and may be shipped or hand delivered to:

I. PURPOSE OF THE REQUEST

The purpose of this Request for Proposals (RFP) is to provide interested consulting firms with enough information about the professional services desired by the Bismarck-Mandan Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the following project:

Intersection Analysis Study

The MPO is requesting services to complete an evaluation and operational analysis of selected intersections in the cities of Bismarck and Mandan, ND. Analysis will lead to recommendations for optimal traffic control as well as guidance documents for each city to use in future staff-lead analysis efforts. This study will be in cooperation with the cities of Bismarck and Mandan, the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA).

II. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

C. All Proposals must be clearly identified and marked as follows:

D. The MPO will only consider proposals received prior to 4:00 PM Central Time April 19, 2019. Four (4) copies of the written proposal and one (1) electronic copy must be received by the deadline. Electronic copies may be sent via a flash drive or emailed to rdrewlow@bismarcknd.gov. Proposals received after the 4:00 PM deadline will be considered unresponsive and will not be considered for an interview. The MPO reserves the right to reject any or all proposals.

E. Proposal Cut Down:

The Selection Committee intends to interview between three (3) and five (5) consultants, depending on the number and quality of proposals received. Strength of the written proposals will be the basis for awarding an interview. Consultants who are awarded an interview will be notified by phone. Consultants not selected for an interview will be notified in writing.

F. Selection Committee:

The Selection Committee will consist of a four (4) person panel; three (3) voters and one (1) moderator. Committee members represent the following entities: MPO, City of Bismarck, and City of Mandan. The MPO project manager will moderate the interviews and provide a tie breaking vote if needed.

G. Interviews:

Consultants will be evaluated on both the written proposal and in-person interviews. Ranking is based on the criteria listed in Section V: Evaluation Criteria and Process. Interviews are planned to be held on May 16, 2019. Consultants will be given forty-five (45) minutes to present their proposals and entertain questions. The consultants will be responsible for managing their interview and allowing time for questions. There will be fifteen (15) minute breaks between interviews for set up and tear down.

H. Disadvantaged Business Enterprise:

In the event of equally ranked consultants, additional positive consideration will be given to proposals which employ a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) company. The DBE company must be certified with the North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT). This applies equally to the Prime or Sub-Consulting company, and any such company should be identified in the proposal.

I. Selection and Approvals:

Selection will be based on the interview committee's recommendation. All interviewees will be notified of the selection results by phone and formal letter. Approval of the top ranked consultant will be requested of the MPO's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Policy Board.

J. Contract Negotiations:

Contract negotiations will begin immediately after Policy Board approval. First, the MPO requires consultants to develop the study's contract. Secondly, the draft contract is reviewed by MPO Staff, local and federal partners, and legal counsel(s). Contract review can take 4-5 weeks and may require iterative revisions. After negotiations, the MPO intends to execute the contract upon staff authority.

Final negotiations will also require submission of:

- 1) Prime Consultant scope of work and fee schedule not exceeding \$245,000
- 2) Prime Consultant Certificate of Liability Insurance
- 3) Scope of work and fee schedule for ALL Sub-consultants
- 4) Prime Consultant Indirect Cost Form (blank form will be provided by MPO)
- 5) SFN 60233: Prime Consultant Request to Sublet Form (blank form will be provided by MPO)
- 6) Up-to-date SF330 Form for NDDOT (See Section III: Content of Proposals).

III. CONTENT OF PROPOSALS

Length of Proposals:

The proposal pages shall be numbered and limited to eight (8) pages, preferably double sided. The reverse page side would be page 2. The cover page, table of contents, and appendix material will not count toward the eight (8) page limit.

Required Elements for Proposal:

The consultants are requested to be as brief and concise as possible. The consultant's written proposal shall address the following major sections:

- 1. Description of firm
- 2. Organizational chart showing project team and general activities
- 3. Table of key individuals' time-available for project/study
- 4. Understanding of project and proposed work approach
- 5. Brief examples of past, pertinent work projects

Required Elements for Appendix:

The consultant's appendix must include the following items unless noted as 'optional'. The following items will not count toward the eight (8) page limit and may take as many pages as needed.

- <u>Proposed Project Schedule</u>: Proposed schedules may begin as soon as May 21, 2019 and should detail all activities necessary to complete the study. Activities may include but are not limited to:
 - Monthly Updates (via telephone or in person) to MPO TAC and Policy Boards
 - Data Acquisition (provided, as available, by MPO, NDDOT, City of Bismarck, and City of Mandan)
 - Stakeholder Interviews

- Steering Committee Meetings/ Activities
- Public Outreach Activities (webpage, meetings, social media, news releases, etc.)
- Public Input Meetings
- Documents/Tech Memos for Study Milestones
- Draft Report Development
- Draft Report Review by MPO projected Manager and Steering Committee (Required before review by NDDOT, FHWA and FTA; will take approximately 2-3 weeks)
- Draft report Review by NDDOT, FHWA, and FTA (required before presentation to Commissions and MPO Boards; will take approximately 1 month)
- Final Presentations to the Bismarck City Commission, Mandan City Commission, and MPO TAC and Policy Boards
- Quality Control/Quality Assurance (QC/QA) program: Detail the program that will be used on the project. This (QC/QA) program must identify the team members, their responsibilities, and stages of development at which each is to be responsible.
- Required Qualification Based Selection (QBS) Documents:
 - Signed Proposed Sub-Consultant Request Form (Appendix A)
 - Signed Consultant Self Certification of Government-Wide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement)
 Form (Appendix B)
 - Signed and Notarized Certification and Restriction on Lobbying Form (Appendix C)
- Resumes or list of Personnel: Detail who will be assigned to work on the project (including titles, education, and/or work experience).
- Optional: Consultants are encouraged to update or complete a Federal Standard Form 330 (Architect-Engineer Qualifications). The SF 330 is an NDDOT requirement, and proves the consultant is pre-qualified to provide architectural, engineering and/or planning services for NDDOT. Consultants will not be penalized if the SF 330 is omitted in their proposal, but the consultant selected for contract negotiations must provide an active SF330 before the contract can be signed.

Disclosure of Proposal Ownership:

After the selection process, the contents of all proposals will be subject to the City of Bismarck's Open Records Law and may be open to inspection by interested parties. Any information included in the proposal that the proposing party believes to be a trade secret or proprietary information must be clearly identified in the proposal. Any identified information documented as such and protected by law may be exempt from disclosure.

IV: ADDITIONAL REQUIRMENTS AND MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

Federal and State Contract Requirements:

NDDOT and FHWA require that specific clauses accompany federally funded projects executed by the MPO. Consultants should be prepared to abide by the necessary clauses and include each verbatim and unaltered in a potential contract. *The clauses can be reviewed in Appendix D: Federal, State and Local Clauses.*

MPO Contract Requirements:

The MPO desires specific clauses in all their study contracts. Consultants should be prepared to abide by the following italicized section and include the clauses verbatim and unaltered in a potential contract.

The MPO reserves the right to hold ten percent (10%) of the total contracted invoiced amounts until the MPO believes it has received all of the following to its satisfaction:

- Contracted deliverables as described in the RFP and final contract;
- Completed tasks as described in the RFP and final contract; and
- Satisfactory final product project and/or study

If the MPO determines that the progress of the study is not acceptable as measured through the consultant supplied project schedule, which will be an attachment to the signed and approved contract, the MPO reserves the right to terminate the contract with the consultant with a 45-day written notice.

The MPO desires continuity of consultant staff throughout the project from the firm chosen. If the consultant replaces key staff and the MPO is dissatisfied with replacement staff, the firm chosen will have 30 days from written notice from the MPO to supply replacement key staff acceptable to the MPO. If the firm chosen fails to supply acceptable replacement staff within the 30-day period, the MPO may cancel the contract.

<u>Ownership of Work Product:</u> All work products and copyrights of the contract, which result from the contract, are the exclusive property of NDDOT, with an unlimited license for use by the federal government and its assignees without charge.

General Information:

The Bismarck-Mandan MPO reserves the right to enter into a supplementary agreement to have the selected firm perform any additional work not currently assigned.

If the contract is terminated prior to completion of the final report, all work completed, which has been compensated for, shall become the property of the NDDOT, as per the 'Ownership of Work Product' Clause. The final report will be submitted using the following formats and standards, if applicable:

- MS Word/ MS Excel
- Adobe Acrobat (Standard or Compatible)
- NDDOT Data Collection Codes and Procedures
- NDDOT and/or City, as applicable, Drafting Standards
- NDDOT Design Manual
- Chapter 19 NDDOT Survey and Photogrammetry Manual

V. EVALUATION CRITERIA AND PROCESS

The selection process will be completed in accordance with Bismarck-Mandan MPO policies. Written proposals shall address the firm's ability to perform the necessary services in the allotted time with qualified personnel. Selection will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Recent, current, and projected workloads
- 2. Ability of professional personnel (staff experience and technical capabilities)
- 3. Related experience on similar projects
- 4. Location
- 5. Project understanding, issues and approach
- 6. Past Performance

The final selection will be based on written proposals along with in-person interviews. All firms not selected will be notified in writing.

In the event of equally ranked consultants, additional positive consideration will be given to proposals which employ a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) company. See Section II: General Instructions for more information.

A final scope of work will be developed, and price will be negotiated, with the successful firm. The successful firms will complete a cost schedule **not exceeding \$245,000** before contract negations are finalized. An agreement will be executed with a single firm. If unable to arrive at an agreement with the top ranked firm, the MPO retains the right to move on to negotiations with the second (then third, etc.) ranked firm. Approved sub-agreements for minor portions of the work will be permitted.

VI. REGIONAL CONTEXT AND EXISTING CONDITIONS

Bismarck-Mandan MPO Region:

The Bismarck-Mandan MPO consists of the cities of Mandan, Bismarck, and Lincoln, and the metropolitan portions of Burleigh and Morton County. The MPO has a performance-based planning process that supports metropolitan community development and federal, state and local transportation goals. These plans and programs are intended to lead to the development of an integrated, multi-modal metropolitan transportation system that facilitates the safe, efficient and economic movement of people and goods.

The MPO planning area is roughly 394 square miles with an estimated population of approximately 115,000 and 50,000 households (Source: 2013-2017 5-year American Community Survey). The MPO area is bisected from north to south by the Missouri River and is generally comprised of rolling topography throughout. One of the more noteworthy challenges facing the MPO planning area is the heightened level of growth, experienced largely to energy development in western North Dakota from 2011-2015. Historic growth trends in the MPO area have traditionally hovered within a 1% to 1.5% annual rate of population growth. The currently adopted growth projection has two components 1) a five-year boom period, with 1.8% annual growth, occurring sometime over the 30-year planning horizon and 2) an historic 1.2% annual growth rate for all other years. After the 'boom' period is smoothed across the planning horizon, the overall growth projection is 1.3% for the period between 2015 and 2045.

While the population growth is generally perceived as positive, there are some noteworthy concerns, specifically: the impact of recent growth on public service costs, the continued ability of the MPO region to grow in an efficient manner, and the ability to maintain the high quality of life enjoyed by residents of the communities. Heightened rates of growth strain many aspects of the region's transportation infrastructure. Topography, man-made barriers, and historical development patterns have contributed to challenges regarding roadway connectivity, specifically north-south movements in Bismarck. The heightened level of growth has also created a greater strain on area municipal services, schools, and transportation. The MPO's local jurisdictions have worked diligently to meet these needs, and now must develop a balance to accommodate the expanding systems but also maintain current, aging infrastructure.

Existing Conditions:

The Cities of Bismarck and Mandan have seen appreciable growth in the last 5-10 years. With increased traffic and network development, they strive to maintain roadway safety and efficiency. This includes the incorporation of blue-light confirmation signals, an annual street maintenance program, traffic signal upgrades, and pedestrian countdown signal heads. The MPO and cities have also participated in a recent acquisition of traffic count data for over 100 intersections. This data includes 24-hour TMC's, select 48-Hr volume counts, and select 48-hr class counts. The MPO houses the data in a web-portal. It is the MPO's intention to house future counts within the portal.

VII. OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this study is to provide the Bismarck-Mandan MPO, the City of Bismarck, and the City of Mandan sound guidance on traffic control options for intersections within corporate limits. Data collection and/or specialized analysis is requested for sixty-five (65) to seventy (70) intersections. Results of this analysis should directly impact safety and efficient flow of major roadways within Bismarck and Mandan. The resulting reports shall also capture national traffic control trends for urbanized areas and establish city-specific guidance for effective traffic control.

Recommendations should be achievable, strategic, cost-effective, and backed by national and state standards. It is imperative the resulting document(s) be user friendly and understandable to decision-makers, staff, and community members. As envisioned, the study will be a traffic control 'Playbook', identifying needs for current intersections and providing tools to empower effective jurisdictional decision making in the future.

VIII: STUDY AREA

The study area includes specific intersections within the corporate limits of Bismarck and Mandan. Most intersections are the convergence of two functionally classified roadways. A few intersections have one non-functionally classified roadway.

NOTE: The MPO's federal funding can only be used for federally eligible efforts. The MPO may allow federal funding for data collection and analysis on non-functionally classified roadways, provided this work relates directly to intersection analysis of a functionally classified roadway. Any activity that is not considered intersection analysis, or is otherwise not approved by NDDOT or FHWA, is not eligible for federal reimbursement. The local jurisdiction will be responsible for non-eligible charges. Consultant(s) may need sperate contracts with the respective city(ies) for this work.

IX. SCOPE OF WORK

Project Management

This task involves activities required to manage the project including staff, equipment, and documentation. It also includes the preparation of progress reports, documenting travel and expense receipts, and preparing and submitting invoices in a timely manner. This task includes monthly progress reports to the MPO, the Technical Advisory Committee, and to the Policy Board.

Steering Committee(s):

The MPO project manager will assist the consultant in developing a Steering Committee(s) for the study. The Committee(s) may contain but are not limited to the following members:

- City Engineers/ City Traffic Engineers
- · City Planners
- Staff member(s) of the MPO
- NDDOT Local Government Division
- FHWA
- FTA

The consultant shall meet with the Steering Committee periodically, and as necessary, during the study process to review data and recommendations.

The consultant shall provide progress/technical memorandums at key points throughout the study process. Enough copies shall be provided for the distribution to the Steering Committee.

Best Practices and Literature Review:

Consultants will be required to complete a best practices and literature review regarding traffic control devices in urbanized areas. The discussion should center round intersections of collectors and/or arterial roadways. Topics could include:

- Discussion of the traditional signalized and non-signalized traffic control
- Discussion of new traffic control devices (i.e. mini-roundabout, smart technology, AV-CV considerations)
- Discussion of the use and implementation of traditional and new traffic controls for an urbanized area.
- Importance of appropriately regulating traffic control (including contrast of up-regulation and down-regulation)
- Discussion of traffic signal timing strategies
- Suggest changes in local practices (i.e. using yield signs vs. stops signs, preparing intersections for AC-CV vehicles)

Data Collection:

Each city has identified a list of intersections they would like analyzed. These are listed in Table 1 and Table 2 on page 14 and 15. The tables also identify if the roadways in question are functionally classified and the latest know traffic count. Finally, the tables identify the type of traffic collection needed, the entity responsible for the collection, and the type(s) analysis requested for the intersection.

NOTE: The MPO's federal funding can only be used for federally eligible efforts. The MPO may allow federal funding for data collection and intersections analysis on non-functionally classified roadways, provided this work relates directly to intersection analysis of a functionally classified roadway. Any activity that is not considered intersection analysis, or is otherwise not approved by NDDOT or FHWA, is not eligible for federal reimbursement. The local jurisdiction will be responsible for non-eligible charges. Consultant(s) may need sperate contracts with the respective city(ies) for this work.

Data Collection and Data Housing:

TMC data from 2016 and 2018 is available for most intersections identified for analysis. Available traffic count data is listed in red text in Table 1 and Table 2. Petra-Pro and/ or PDF versions of this data by direct request to the MPO. The selected consultants may be given access to the web-based version of this data after an approved contract is signed. This provides access to further analytics.

The consultant will be required to collect thirteen (13) video-based turning count movements (TMC) for twelve (12) locations within the cites of Bismarck and Mandan. These locations are highlighted in blue on Table 1 and Table 2. The types of counts requested include:

- 1) 24-Hr Turning Movement Count
 - a. Complete 24-hour turning movement counts on all portions of the identified intersections.
- 2) Peak-Hour Turning Movement Count
 - a. Complete peak hour turning movement counts (i.e. 6:00 8:00 AM; 4:00 6:00 PM) on all portions of the identified intersection(s).

NDDOT will be conducting traffic counts for Bismarck and Mandan in the spring of 2019. Their collection includes a mixture of 24- and 48-Hr volume counts (tube collection), 24-HR TMC's, and 48-Hr ATR. The MPO believes that portions of this collection will be adequate for the requested analyses on seven (7) intersections. These seven locations are highlighted in green on Table 1. One (1) intersection will be a combined collection effort by NDDOT and the City of Bismarck. This location is highlighted in gold on Table 1. This data will be made available for consultant analysis.

Once all the needed counts have been collected, the consultant and MPO will work together to ensure that all data is uploaded into the MPO's online portal for traffic counts.

Signal Warrants and Intersection Analysis:

Consultant will be required to conduct signal warrants and/or additional intersection analysis on the established list of sixty-five (65) intersections. Consultants are also encouraged to build into their scope of work analyses for up to five (5) additional intersections, which will be identified by the steering committee or the public. These are not anticipated to require a signal warrant analysis.

Signal Warrant Analysis:

A total of twenty-five (25) intersections have been identified for signals warrant analysis. Intersections are both signalized and unsignalized. Consultants will use appropriate guidance and traffic count data to conduct the analysis. To the best of their ability, the City of Bismarck and the City of Mandan, have identified which intersections will require additional types of analysis. These are listed in Table 1 and Table 2 but are subject to change during the study.

If a signal is *warranted*, the consultant is advised to complete logical follow-up analysis. This may include signal timing, left-turn phasing, lane designation and/or roundabout analyses. The final report shall discuss each intersection, the results of the signal warrant and public feedback, recommendations to improve intersection safety and efficiency, and all applicable cost assumptions. More specific direction will be given by the MPO and steering committee during the study.

If a signal is *not warranted*, the consultant is requested to conduct 1) a removal warrant and 2) any logical follow-up analysis. This may include all-way stop, two-way stop, lane designation and/or roundabout analyses. The final report shall discuss each intersection, results of the signal warrant analysis/ additional analysis/ public feedback, recommended traffic control (including maintaining the signal), and all applicable cost assumptions. More specific direction will be given by the MPO and steering committee during the study.

Other Intersection Analysis:

Approximately forty (40) additional intersections have been identified for analysis. Intersections are both signalized and unsignalized, and the requested analyses are listed in Table 1 and Table 2. Consultants will use appropriate guidance and traffic count data to conduct the analyses. The final report shall discuss each intersection, results of the analyses and public feedback, recommendations for improved intersection safety and efficiency, and cost assumptions of each traffic control treatment recommended.

The types of analysis requested include:

- 1) All-Way Stop Analysis
 - a. Determine if all-way stop is necessary at identified intersections and provide peak hour LOS analysis. If not warranted, recommend alternative traffic control and estimate the cost for each treatment.
- 2) Two-Way Stop Analysis
 - a. Determine if two-way stop is necessary at identified intersections and provide peak hour LOS analysis. If not warranted, recommend alternative traffic control and estimate the cost for each treatment.
- 3) Left Turn Phasing Analysis
 - a. Analyze the left turning movements of the identified intersections and recommend if protected and/or permissive phasing measures are warranted. If so, identify the optimal left-turn phase(s) by time of day.
- 5) Lane Designation Analysis
 - a. Analyze traffic movements through the identified intersections and recommend optimal lane configuration as the roadways approach the intersection. Consultants will consider loss of on-street parking in their analysis of lane designation. All recommendations shall stay within the existing pavement right-of-way.
- 6) Signal Timing Analysis
 - a. Perform a signal timing analysis of the identified intersections and recommend optimal phasing by time of day. Also, if the lane designation changes for a given intersection, conduct a supplementary signal timing analysis.
- 7) Roundabout Analysis
 - a. Analyze the identified intersections and determine their appropriateness for implementation of a miniroundabout. Discuss needs for right-away, cost assumptions, and benefits to traffic flow.

Develop Community 'Playbooks'

The final deliverable for this study be will two reports; one for Bismarck and one for Mandan. The reports will be a 'Playbook' for the MPO and the respective city's engineering department. The document will take into consideration national MUTCD standards, other state, federal, and local guidance, as well as the unique traffic characteristics of the respective city. The documents will outline—in text, table, and/or graphical format—what traffic control infrastructure(s) are most appropriate for a given condition.

The documents should incorporate:

- Best practices and literature review
- Analysis of the identified intersection, recommendations and cost estimates
- City-specific guidance and evaluation tools (described below)

Guidance and Evaluation Tools:

The 'Playbook' will also contain a 'Guidance' section. The 'Guidance' will include evaluation tools which can be used by the cities to assess traffic control needs in the future, especially for intersections not identified in this study. This section is intended to be an 'easy-to-use' reference for future decision making.

The evaluation tools should include checklists, matrices, or practical tools. They should define the criteria and thresholds recommended to implement various traffic control options. Criteria may include but is not limited to: intersection type (i.e. arterial-arterial, arterial-collector), sight distance, crashes, proximity to school zones/ identified SRTS routes, roadway speed, traffic counts, turning movement volume, previous traffic warrants, vehicle type, right-of-way availability, other elements of operationality, and option for sound professional judgment.

The following special consideration(s) should be given to the respective city's document:

Bismarck 'Playbook':

1) The City of Bismarck requests that their 'Playbook' include a section about mini-roundabouts. They seek guidance about when, where, and how mini-roundabouts should be incorporated into future pavement management projects.

Mandan 'Playbook':

- 1) The City of Mandan requests that their 'Playbook' include a section about mini-roundabouts. They seek guidance about when, where, and how mini-roundabouts should be incorporated into future pavement management projects.
- 2) The City of Mandan requests that their 'Playbook' discuss 'alternative confirmation', which may warrant traffic control when volumes do not meet established standards. This is not to undermine national guidance, but rather to identify 'other data' which may substantiate the implementation (or removal of) traffic control. Mandan desires that this guidance set standards for down-regulation as well as up-regulation.

Prepare for a Roundabout Demo in Bismarck:

The City of Bismarck would like to plan for a temporary mini-roundabout demonstration. This study will NOT include a demonstration but will establish a step-by-step guide for the city to conduct effort on their own. Consultants are requested to identity an appropriate location(s) for the future demonstration, design a conceptual layout of the mini-roundabout, and prepare generalized public notice flyers, generalized materials list, and cost estimates for the project.

Monthly TAC and Policy Board Meetings:

The consultant will provide monthly updates (i.e. progress reports) to the MPO TAC and Policy Boards. Updates will be conducted verbally and with written memorandums, briefly updating board members on the status of the project. A minimum of one (1) personal appearances is also required before the TAC and Policy Board during the development or completion of the study.

Public Involvement:

See Section XI: Public Involvement Plan for detailed information.

X. REVIEW AND COMPLETION PROCESS

A. Draft Development and Review:

A draft report shall be produced after all recommendations have been developed and approved by the Steering Committee(s). Electronic and/ or paper copies of the draft report shall be provided for the Steering Committee(s), the MPO project manager, NDDOT, FHWA and FTA for their review and comment. All comments from the MPO, NDDOT, FHWA, and FTA shall be addressed to the respective entity's satisfaction prior to development of the final draft and final presentations.

B. Final Presentations/ Completion:

The draft report shall be advertised and made available to the public for a minimum of fifteen (15) days before the final presentations.

The consultant will be requested to make a presentation to the Bismarck Board of City Commissioners, the Mandan Board of City Commissioners, the MPO Technical Advisory Committee and the MPO Policy Board for review and acceptance/approval of the final draft report. Approval of the final draft report by the MPO Policy Board, and subsequent distribution of study deliverables, will mark the completion of the study.

C. Deliverables:

The final study report shall be produced after all comments on the draft report are addressed, final presentations are complete, and the report has been approved by the MPO TAC and Policy Board. A minimum of three (3) paper copies shall be provided for each jurisdiction (3 Bismarck reports and 3 Mandan report). A minimum of four (4) pdf-based electronic copies shall also be provided (2 Bismarck reports and 2 Mandan reports). All products are to be delivered to the MPO project manager for dissemination to the appropriate City, MPO staff, TAC/ Policy Board Member, or oversight agency.

XI. PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN

It is imperative that residents, businesses and stakeholders be involved in the development of the study. Direct effort should be made to obtain broad-based support from the community. Consultants shall prepare a Public Involvement Plan that is consistent with the MPO Public Participation Plan and complies with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Executive Order on Environmental Justice of 1994. The following are the minimum public involvement activities the consultant should include:

- 1) Up to four (4) public meetings/design charrettes for the public, including residents, businesses, and stakeholders. The meetings will occur at two (2) times during the study. Each will include one meeting for Bismarck residents and one meeting for Mandan residents.;
- 2) Up to two (2) newsletters to update the public and stakeholders on study activities. This newsletter will be mailed to the MPO's list of stakeholders (approximately 200 people), made available at public locations (city hall, library, etc.), and e-mailed to anyone who has provided an email contact during the study.;
- 3) A web-site for the study that will be interesting, provide up-to-date information, and be easy to use by the public. This will include a <u>map-based interface for public comments</u> (thumbs-up/ thumbs down, pin-drops, comments, etc.);
- 4) Four (4) final presentation meetings, with potential for each to be a public meeting. One meeting with each of the following entities: Bismarck Board of City Commissioners, Mandan Board of City Commissioners, and MPO TAC and Policy Board.

In-Person/ Community Engagement:

Consultants are encouraged to reach out to the community at large and interested or affected community members. Consultants are encouraged to use novel means to inform the public and gather their opinions. Suggested ideas could include but are not limited to: flyers; updates in city bulletins, radio or television PSAs; coordination with local public or commercial media outlets; presentation to community/ business groups, and public meetings.

Consultants should prepare for up to fur (4) public meetings, which will occur at two designated times during the study. The designated time(s) should include separate meetings for Bismarck and Mandan residents. Meetings should inform the community of the study's purpose, extents, and progress; present existing conditions and alternatives; and engage the public to provide input and seek information on study issues. All input and attendance from the public meetings shall be recorded, ad addressed when necessary, in the study document.

Online Engagement:

The consultant shall create a website to keep the public informed and engaged throughout the study. The website should receive regular updates from the consultant. Material for updates could include pertinent study documents, maps, online surveys, public involvement opportunities, and the drafts and final reports. The website should also track hits/visits to the site.

The MPO requests that consultants use an online, map-based platform for public comments. This could include pins or notes for new comments and thumbs up/thumbs down buttons for recommendations.

Consultants are highly encouraged to dedicate one or more staff to the development and maintenance of social media posts or other online engagement tools to enhance the public involvement process and encourage the public's participation.

The MPO hosts a Facebook page which is intended to be a clearing house for all MPO related social media outreach. The MPO will not allow consultants to create additional Facebook pages for MPO studies. However, the MPO can allow administrative privileges to designated consultant staff during active phases of the study. This arrangement allows consultants (or their designated staff) to provide study updates and public outreach via Facebook, while also allowing the MPO project manager and the City of Bismarck's Public Information Officer convenient access to monitor public responses.

Other Engagement:

Prior to the study's completion, a draft study report will be created, reviewed, and commented upon by the steering committee, MPO, NDDOT, FHWA, and FTA. After all comments have been addressed to the satisfaction of the respective entity, the consultant will prepare final presentations and seek study approval/ acceptance from the following: Bismarck Board of City Commissioners, Mandan Board of City Commissioners, the MPO Technical Advisory Committee, and the MPO Policy Board.

Public meetings and final presentations will be advertised in the local newspaper(s). Consultants are responsible for preparing newspaper advertisements for public meetings and final presentations. The MPO reviews the ads, provides necessary modifications to language and formatting, and coordinates and pays for printing with the local newspaper(s).

The MPO and contractor agree to ensure that disadvantaged business enterprises as defined in 49 CFR Part 26 have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts and subcontracts financed in whole or in part with federal funds provided under or pursuant to this Agreement. In this regard, the contractor shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure that disadvantaged business enterprises have the maximum opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. The contractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, creed, color, national origin, age, or sex in the award and performance of DOT-assisted contracts.

The consultant's efforts to involve DBE businesses in this project needs to be shown. If the consultant is a DBE, a statement indicating that the business is certified by the NDDOT as a DBE/MBE shall be included in the proposal. If the consultant intends to utilize a DBE to complete a portion of this work, a statement of the subcontractor's certification by the NDDOT shall be included. The percent of the total proposed cost to be completed by the DBE shall be shown. A copy of NDDOT's current certified DBE Directory can be secured at the Bismarck-Mandan MPO.

RISK MANAGEMENT

CONSULTANT agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the OWNER and the state of North Dakota, its agencies, officers and employees (State), from and against claims based on the vicarious liability of the OWNER and the State or its agents, but not against claims based on the OWNER's and the State's contributory negligence, comparative and/or contributory negligence or fault, sole negligence, or intentional misconduct. The legal defense provided by CONSULTANT to the OWNER and the State under this provision must be free of any conflicts of interest, even if retention of separate legal counsel for the OWNER and the State is necessary. CONSULTANT also agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold the OWNER and the State harmless for all costs, expenses and attorneys' fees incurred if the OWNER or the State prevails in an action against CONSULTANT in establishing and litigating the indemnification coverage provided herein. This obligation shall continue after the termination of this Agreement.

CONSULTANT shall secure and keep in force during the term of this agreement, from insurance companies, government self-insurance pools or government self-retention funds authorized to do business in North Dakota, the following insurance coverages:

- 1) Commercial general liability and automobile liability insurance minimum limits of liability required are \$250,000 per person and \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
- 2) Workforce Safety insurance meeting all statutory limits.
- 3) The OWNER and the State of North Dakota, its agencies, officers, and employees (State) shall be endorsed as an additional insured on the commercial general liability and automobile liability policies.
- 4) Said endorsements shall contain a "Waiver of Subrogation" in favor of the OWNER and the state of North Dakota.
- 5) The policies and endorsements may not be canceled or modified without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the undersigned OWNER and the State Risk Management Department.

The CONSULTANT shall furnish a certificate of insurance evidencing the requirements in 1, 3, and 4, above to the OWNER prior to commencement of this agreement.

The OWNER and the State reserve the right to obtain complete, certified copies of all required insurance documents, policies, or endorsements at any time. Any attorney who represents the State under this contract must first qualify as and be appointed by the North Dakota Attorney General as a Special Assistant Attorney General as required under N.D.C.C. Section 54-12-08.

When a portion of the work under the Agreement is sublet, the CONSULTANT shall

obtain insurance protection (as outlined above) to provide liability coverage to protect the CONSULTANT, the OWNER and the State as a result of work undertaken by the Subcontractor. In addition, the CONSULTANT shall ensure that any and all parties performing work under the Agreement are covered by public liability insurance as outlined above. All Subcontractors performing work under the Agreement are required to maintain the same scope of insurance required of the CONSULTANT. The CONSULTANT shall be held responsible for ensuring compliance with those requirements by all Subcontractors.

CONSULTANT's insurance coverage shall be primary (i.e., pay first) as respects any insurance, self-insurance or self-retention maintained by the OWNER or State. Any insurance, self-insurance or self-retention maintained by the OWNER or the State shall be excess of the CONSULTANT's insurance and shall not contribute with it. The insolvency or bankruptcy of the insured CONSULTANT shall not release the insurer from payment under the policy, even when such insolvency or bankruptcy prevents the insured CONSULTANT from meeting the retention limit under the policy. Any deductible amount or other obligations under the policy(ies) shall be the sole responsibility of the CONSULTANT. This insurance may be in a policy or policies of insurance, primary and excess, including the so-called umbrella or catastrophe form and be placed with insurers rated "A-" or better by A.M. Best Company, Inc. The OWNER and the State will be indemnified, saved, and held harmless to the full extent of any coverage actually secured by the CONSULTANT in excess of the minimum requirements set forth above.

TITLE VI ASSURANCES

The Recipient, in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4, and Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted Programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation, issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that in any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, Disadvantaged Business Enterprises will be afforded full opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, national origin, sex, age, disability, or income status in consideration for an award.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the Contractor), agrees as follows:

- Compliance with Regulations: The Contractor shall comply with the regulations relative to nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time (hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this contract.
- 2. Nondiscrimination: The Contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, age, disability, or income status, in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. or award of the underlying contract, absent the express written consent by the US Government, the US Government is not a party to this contract and shall not be subject to any obligations or liabilities to the recipient, the contractor, or any other party (whether or not a party to that contract) pertaining to any matter resulting from the underlying contract.

(2) Contractor agrees to include the above clause in each subcontract financed in whole or in part with FTA assistance. It is further agreed that the clause shall not be modified, except to identify the subcontractor who will be subject to its provisions.

Upon execution of the underlying contract, contractor certifies or affirms the truthfulness and accuracy of any statement it has made, it makes, it may make, or causes to be made, pertaining to the underlying contract or FTA assisted project for which this contract work is being performed. In addition to other penalties that may be applicable, contractor further acknowledges that if it makes, or causes to be made, a false, fictitious, or fraudulent claim, statement, submittal, or certification, the US Government reserves the right to impose the penalties of the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act (1986) on contractor to the extent the US Government deems appropriate.
- (2) If contractor makes, or causes to be made, a false, fictitious, or fraudulent claim, statement, submittal, or certification to the US Government under a contract connected with a project that is financed in whole or in part with FTA assistance under the authority of 49 USC 5307, the Government reserves the right to impose the penalties of 18 USC 1001 and 49 USC 5307(n)(1) on contractor, to the extent the US Government deems appropriate. (3) Contractor shall include the above two clauses in each subcontract financed in whole or in part with FTA assistance. The clauses shall not be modified, except to identify the subcontractor who will be subject to the provisions.

Termination – Applicability – All Contracts over \$10,000, except contracts with nonprofit organizations and institutions of higher learning, where the threshold is \$250,000

- a. Termination for Convenience (General Provision) the recipient may terminate this contract, in whole or in part, at any time by written notice to contractor when it is in the recipient's best interest. Contractor shall be paid its costs, including contract close-out costs, and profit on work performed up to the time of termination. Contractor shall promptly submit its termination claim to the recipient. If contractor is in possession of any of the recipient's property, contractor shall account for same, and dispose of it as the recipient directs.
- b. Termination for Default [Breach or Cause] (General Provision) If contractor does not deliver items in accordance with the contract delivery schedule, or, if the contract is for services, and contractor fails to perform in the manner called for in the contract, or if contractor fails to comply with any other provisions of the contract, the recipient may terminate this contract for default. Termination shall be effected by serving a notice of termination to contractor setting forth the manner in which contractor is in default. Contractor shall only be paid the contract price for supplies delivered and accepted, or for services performed in accordance with the manner of performance set forth in the contract. If it is later determined by the recipient that contractor had an excusable reason for not performing, such as a strike, fire, or flood, events which are not the fault of or are beyond the control of contractor, the recipient, after setting up a new delivery or performance schedule, may allow contractor to continue work, or treat the termination as a termination for convenience
- c. Opportunity to Cure (General Provision) the recipient in its sole discretion may, in the case of a termination for breach or default, allow contractor an appropriately short period of time in which to cure the defect. In such case, the notice of termination shall state the time period in which cure is permitted and other appropriate conditions If contractor fails to remedy to the recipient's satisfaction the breach or default or any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Contract within ten (10) days after receipt by contractor or written notice from the recipient setting forth the nature of said breach or default, the recipient shall have the right to terminate the Contract without any further obligation to contractor. Any such termination for default shall not in any way operate to preclude the recipient from also pursuing all available remedies against contractor and its sureties for said breach or default.
- d. Waiver of Remedies for any Breach In the event that the recipient elects to waive its remedies for any breach by contractor of any covenant, term or condition of this Contract, such waiver by the recipient shall not limit its remedies for any succeeding breach of that or of any other term, covenant, or condition of this Contract.
- e. Termination for Convenience (Professional or Transit Service Contracts) the recipient, by written notice, may terminate this contract, in whole or in part, when it is in the recipient's interest. If the contract is terminated, the recipient shall be liable only for payment under the payment provisions of this contract for services rendered before the effective date of termination.
- f. Termination for Default (Supplies and Service) If contractor fails to deliver supplies or to perform the services within the time specified in this contract or any extension or if the contractor fails to comply with any other provisions of this contract, the recipient may terminate this contract for default. The recipient shall terminate by delivering to contractor a notice of termination specifying the nature of default. Contractor shall only be paid the contract price for supplies delivered and accepted, or services performed in accordance with the manner or performance set forth in this contract. If, after termination for failure to fulfill contract obligations, it is determined that contractor was not in default, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if termination had been issued for the recipient's convenience.
- g. Termination for Default (Transportation Services) If contractor fails to pick up the commodities or to perform the services, including delivery services, within the time specified in this contract or any extension or if contractor fails to comply with any other provisions of this contract, the recipient may terminate this contract for default. The recipient shall terminate by delivering to contractor a notice of termination specifying the nature of default. Contractor shall only be paid the contract price for services performed in accordance with the manner of performance set forth in this contract. If this contract is terminated while contractor has possession of the recipient goods, contractor shall, as directed by the recipient, protect and preserve the goods until surrendered to the recipient or its agent. Contractor and the recipient shall agree on payment for the preservation and protection of goods. Failure to agree on an amount shall be resolved under the Dispute clause. If, after termination for failure to fulfill contract obligations, it is determined that contractor was not in default, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if termination had been issued for the recipient's convenience.
- h. Termination for Default (Construction) If contractor refuses or fails to prosecute the work or any separable part, with the diligence that will insure its completion within the time specified, or any extension, or fails to complete the work within this time, or if contractor fails to comply with any other provisions of this contract, the recipient may terminate this contract for default. the recipient shall terminate by delivering to contractor a notice of termination specifying the nature of default. In this event, the recipient may take over the work and compete it by contract or otherwise, and may take possession of and use any materials, appliances, and plant on the work site necessary for completing the work. Contractor and its sureties shall be liable for any damage to the recipient resulting from contractor's refusal or failure to complete the work within specified time, whether or not contractor's right to proceed with the work is terminated. This liability includes any increased costs incurred by the recipient in completing the work. Contractor's right to proceed shall not be terminated nor shall contractor be charged with damages under this clause if:
- 1. Delay in completing the work arises from unforeseeable causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of contractor. Examples of such causes include: acts of God, acts of the recipient, acts of another contractor in the performance of a contract with the recipient, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight embargoes; and
- 2. Contractor, within 10 days from the beginning of any delay, notifies the recipient in writing of the causes of delay. If in the recipient's judgment, delay is excusable, the time for completing the work shall be extended. The recipient's judgment shall be final and conclusive on the parties, but subject to appeal under the Disputes clauses.
- If, after termination of contractor's right to proceed, it is determined that contractor was not in default, or that the delay was excusable, the rights and obligations of the parties will be the same as if termination had been issued for the recipient's convenience.
- i. Termination for Convenience or Default (Architect & Engineering) the recipient may terminate this contract in whole or in part, for the recipient's convenience or because of contractor's failure to fulfill contract obligations. The recipient shall terminate by delivering to contractor a notice of termination specifying the nature, extent, and effective date of termination. Upon receipt of the notice, contractor shall (1) immediately discontinue all services affected (unless the notice directs otherwise), and (2) deliver to the recipient all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimates, summaries, and other information and materials accumulated in performing this contract, whether completed or in process. If termination is for the recipient's convenience, it shall make
- an equitable adjustment in the contract price but shall allow no anticipated profit on unperformed services. If termination is for contractor's failure to fulfill contract obligations, the recipient may complete the work by contact or otherwise and contractor shall be liable for any additional cost incurred by the recipient. If, after termination for failure to fulfill contract obligations, it is determined that contractor was not in default, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if termination had been issued for the recipient's convenience.
- j. Termination for Convenience or Default (Cost-Type Contracts) the recipient may terminate this contract, or any portion of it, by serving a notice or termination on contractor. The notice shall state whether termination is for convenience of the recipient or for default of contractor. If termination is for default, the notice shall state the manner in which contractor has failed to perform the requirements of the contract. Contractor shall account for any property in its possession paid for from funds received from the recipient, or property supplied to contractor by the recipient. If termination is for default, the recipient may fix the fee, if the contract provides for a fee, to be paid to contractor in proportion to the value, if any, of work performed up to the time of termination. Contractor shall promptly submit its termination claim to the recipient and the parties shall negotiate the termination settlement to be paid to contractor. If termination is for the recipient's convenience, contractor shall be paid its contract close-out costs, and a fee, if the contract provided for payment of a fee, in proportion to the work performed up to the time of termination. If, after serving a notice of termination for default, the recipient

determines that contractor has an excusable reason for not performing, such as strike, fire, flood, events which are not the fault of and are beyond the control of contractor, the recipient, after setting up a new work schedule, may allow contractor to continue work, or treat the termination as a termination for convenience

<u>Government-Wide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement)</u> – Applicability – Contracts over \$25,000 The Recipient agrees to the following:

(1) It will comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. part 180, subpart C, as adopted and supplemented by U.S. DOT regulations at 2 C.F.R. part 1200, which include the following: (a) It will not enter into any arrangement to participate in the development or implementation of the Project with any Third Party Participant that is debarred or suspended except as authorized by: 1 U.S. DOT regulations, "Nonprocurement Suspension and Debarment," 2 C.F.R. part 1200, 2 U.S. OMB, "Guidelines to Agencies on Governmentwide Debarment and Suspension (Nonprocurement)," 2 C.F.R. part 180, including any amendments thereto, and 3 Executive Orders Nos. 12549 and 12689, "Debarment and Suspension," 31 U.S.C. § 6101 note, (b) It will review the U.S. GSA "System for Award Management," https:// www.sam.gov, if required by U.S. DOT regulations, 2 C.F.R. part 1200, and (c) It will include, and require each of its Third Party Participants to include, a similar provision in each lower tier covered transaction, ensuring that each lower tier Third Party Participant: 1 Will comply with Federal debarment and suspension requirements, and 2 Reviews the "System for Award Management" at https://www.sam.gov, if necessary to comply with U.S. DOT regulations, 2 C.F.R. part 1200, and (2) If the Recipient suspends, debars, or takes any similar action against a Third Party Participant or individual, the Recipient will provide immediate written notice to the: (a) FTA Regional Counsel for the Region in which the Recipient is located or implements the

Project, (b) FTA Project Manager if the Project is administered by an FTA Headquarters Office, or (c) FTA Chief Counsel,

Contracts Involving Federal Privacy Act Requirements – Applicability – When a grantee maintains files on drug and alcohol enforcement activities for FTA, and those files are organized so that information could be retrieved by personal identifier, the Privacy Act requirements apply to all contracts except micro-purchases (\$10,000 or less, except for construction contracts over \$2,000)

- h. Drug or Alcohol Abuse Confidentiality and Other Civil Rights Protections. The Recipient agrees to comply with the confidentiality and civil rights protections of: (1) The Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972, as amended, 21 U.S.C. § 1101 et seq., (2) The Comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Act of 1970, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 4541 et seq., and (3) The Public Health Service Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. §§ 290dd 290dd-2,
- i. Access to Services for People with Limited English Proficiency. Except as the Federal Government determines otherwise in writing, the Recipient agrees to promote accessibility of public transportation services to people whose understanding of English is limited by following: 1) Executive Order No. 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," August 11, 2000, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d-1 note, and (2) U.S. DOT Notice, "DOT Policy Guidance Concerning Recipients' Responsibilities to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Persons," 70 Fed. Reg. 74087, December 14, 2005,
- j. Other Nondiscrimination Laws. Except as the Federal Government determines otherwise in writing, the Recipient agrees to: (1) Comply with other applicable Federal nondiscrimination laws and regulations, and (2) Follow Federal guidance prohibiting discrimination.
- k. Remedies. Remedies for failure to comply with applicable Federal Civil Rights laws and Federal regulations may be enforced as provided in those Federal laws or Federal regulations.

Breaches and Dispute Resolution – Applicability – All contracts over \$250,000 Disputes arising in the performance of this contract which are not resolved by agreement of the parties shall be decided in writing by the recipient's authorized representative. This decision shall be final and conclusive unless within ten days from the date of receipt of its copy, contractor mails or otherwise furnishes a written appeal to the recipient's CEO. In connection with such appeal, contractor shall be afforded an opportunity to be heard and to offer evidence in support of its position. The decision of the recipient's CEO shall be binding upon contractor and contractor shall abide by the decision. FTA has a vested interest in the settlement of any violation of Federal law including the False Claims Act, 31 U.S.C. § 3729.

<u>Performance During Dispute</u> - Unless otherwise directed by the recipient, contractor shall continue performance under this contract while matters in dispute are being resolved. Claims for Damages - Should either party to the contract suffer injury or damage to person or property because of any act or omission of the party or of any of his employees, agents or others for whose acts he is legally liable, a claim for damages therefore shall be made in writing to such other party within ten days after the first observance of such injury or damage.

arising out of or relating to this agreement or its breach will be decided by arbitration if the parties mutually agree, or in a court of competent jurisdiction within the residing State.

<u>Rights and Remedies</u> - Duties and obligations imposed by the contract documents and the rights and remedies available thereunder shall be in addition to and not a limitation of any duties, obligations, rights and remedies otherwise imposed or available by law. No action or failure to act by the recipient or contractor shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded any of them under the contract, nor shall any such action or failure to act constitute an approval of or acquiescence in any breach thereunder, except as may be specifically agreed in writing.

Patent and Rights Data - Contracts involving experimental, developmental, or research work (\$10,000 or less, except for construction contracts over \$2,000).

Patent Rights

- A. General. The Recipient agrees that:
- (1) Depending on the nature of the Project, the Federal Government may acquire patent rights when the Recipient or Third Party Participant produces a patented or patentable:

- (2) The Federal Government's rights arise when the patent or patentable information is:
 - (a) Conceived under the Project, or
 - (b) Reduced to practice under the Project, and
- (3) When a patent is issued or patented information becomes available as described in Patent Rights section A(2), the Recipient agrees to:
 - (a) Notify FTA immediately, and
 - (b) Provide a detailed report satisfactory to FTA,
- B. Federal Rights. The Recipient agrees that:
 - (1) Its rights and responsibilities, and the rights and responsibilities of each Third Party Participant, in that federally funded invention, improvement, or discovery will be determined as provided by applicable Federal laws, regulations, and guidance, including any waiver thereof, and
 - (2) Unless the Federal Government determines otherwise in writing, irrespective of the Recipient's status or the status of any Third Party Participant as a large business, a small business, a State government, a State instrumentality, a local government, an Indian tribe, a nonprofit organization, an institution of higher education, or an individual, the Recipient agrees to transmit the Federal Government's patent rights to FTA as specified in: (a) 35 U.S.C. § 200 et seq., and (b) U.S. Department of Commerce regulations, "Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements," 37 C.F.R. part 401, and
- C. License Fees and Royalties. As permitted by 49 C.F.R. parts 18 and 19:
 - (1) License fees and royalties for patents, patent applications, and inventions derived from the Project are program income, and
 - (2) The Recipient has no obligation to the Federal Government with respect to those license fees or royalties, except: (a) For compliance with 35 U.S.C. § 200 et seq., which applies to patent rights developed under a federally funded research-type project, and (b) As FTA determines otherwise in writing.

Rights in Data and Copyrights

- A. Definition of "Subject Data." means recorded information:
- (1) Copyright. Whether or not copyrighted, and
- (2) Delivery. That is delivered or specified to be delivered under the Underlying Agreement,
- B. Examples of "Subject Data." Examples of "subject data":
- (1) Include, but are not limited to:
- (a) Computer software, (b) Standards, (c) Specifications, (d) Engineering drawings and associated lists, (e) Process sheets, (f) Manuals, (g) Technical reports, (h) Catalog item identifications, and (i) Related information, but
- (2) Do not include: (a) Financial reports, (b) Cost analyses, or (c) Other similar information used for Project administration,
- C. General Federal Restrictions. The following restrictions apply to all subject data first produced in the performance of the Recipient's Project supported by the Underlying Agreement: (1) Prohibitions. The Recipient may not: (a) Publish or reproduce any subject data in whole or in part, or in any manner or form, or (b) Permit others to do so, but
- (2) Exceptions. The prohibitions of Rights in Data and Copyrights C(1) do not apply to: (a) Publications or reproductions for the Recipient's own internal use, (b) An institution of higher learning, (c) The portion of subject data that the Federal Government has previously released or approved for release to the public, or (d) The portion of data that has the Federal Government's prior written consent for release,
- D. Federal Rights in Data and Copyrights. The Recipient agrees that:
 - (1) License Rights. The Recipient must provide a license to its "subject data" to the Federal Government, which license is: (a) Royalty-free, (b) Non-exclusive, and (c) Irrevocable,

(2) Uses. The Federal Government's license must permit the Federal Government to take the following actions provided those actions are taken for Federal Government purposes: (a) Reproduce the subject data, (b) Publish the subject data, (c) Otherwise use the subject data, and (d) Permit other entities or individuals to use the subject data, and

E. Special Federal Rights in Data for Research, Development, Demonstration, Deployment, and Special Studies Projects. In general, FTA's purpose in providing Federal funds for a research, development, demonstration, deployment, or special studies Project is to increase transportation knowledge, rather than limit the benefits of the Project to the Recipient and its Third Party Participants, therefore, the Recipient agrees that:

- (1) Publicly Available Report. When the Project is completed, it must provide a Project report that FTA may publish or make available for publication on the Internet,
- (2) Other Reports. It must provide other reports pertaining to the Project that FTA may request,
- (3) Availability of Subject Data. FTA may make available to any FTA Recipient or any of its Third Party Participants at any tier of the Project, either FTA's copyright license to the subject data or a copy of the subject data, except as the Federal Government determines otherwise in writing,
- (4) Identification of Information. It must identify clearly any specific confidential, privileged, or proprietary information submitted to FTA,
- (5) Incomplete Project. If the Project is not completed for any reason whatsoever, all data developed under the Project becomes "subject data" and must be delivered as the Federal Government may direct, but

- G. Hold Harmless. Upon request by the Federal Government, the Recipient agrees that:
 - (1) Violation by Recipient. (a) If it willfully or intentionally violates any: 1 Proprietary rights, 2 Copyrights, or 3 Right of privacy, and (b) Its violation occurs from any of the following uses of Project data: 1 Publication, 2 Translation, 3 Reproduction, 4 Delivery, 5 Use, or 6 Disposition, then (c) It will indemnify, save, and hold harmless against any liability, including costs and expenses of: 1 The Federal Government's officers acting within the scope of their official duties,
 - 2 The Federal Government's employees acting within the scope of their official duties, and
 - 3 Federal Government's agents acting within the scope of their official duties, but (2) Exceptions. The Recipient will not be required to indemnify the Federal Government for any liability described in Rights in Data and Copyrights section G(1) if: (a) Violation by Federal Officers, Employees or Agents. The violation is caused by the wrongful acts of Federal employees or agents, or (b) State law. If indemnification is prohibited or limited by applicable State law,
- H. Restrictions on Access to Patent Rights. Nothing in this Rights in Data and Copyrights section pertaining to rights in data either:
 - (1) Implies a license to the Federal Government under any patent, or
 - (2) May be construed to affect the scope of any license or other right otherwise granted to the Federal Government under any patent,
- I. Data Developed Without Federal Funding or Support. The Recipient understands and agrees that in certain circumstances it may need to provide data developed without any Federal funding or support to FTA. Nevertheless:

Contractor shall also comply with all applicable requirements of Sec. 504 of the Rehabilitation Act (1973), as amended, 29 USC 794, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicaps, and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), as amended, 42 USC 12101 et seq., which requires that accessible facilities and services be made available to persons with disabilities, including any subsequent amendments thereto.

Contractor shall comply with all applicable FTA regulations, policies, procedures and directives, including, without limitation, those listed directly or incorporated by reference in the Master Agreement between the recipient and FTA, as may be amended or promulgated from time to time during the term of this contract. Contractor's failure

to so comply shall constitute a material breach of this contract.

Real Property - Any contract entered into shall contain the following provisions: Contractor shall at all times comply with all applicable statutes and USDOT regulations, policies, procedures and directives governing the acquisition, use and disposal of real property, including, but not limited to, 49 CFR 18.31-18.34, 49 CFR 19.30-19.37, 49 CFR Part 24, 49 CFR 5326 as amended by Map-21, 49 CFR part 18 or 19, 49 USC 5334, applicable FTA Circular 5010, and FTA Master Agreement, as they may be amended or promulgated during the term of this contract. Contractor's failure to so comply shall constitute a material breach of this contract.

Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency - To the extent applicable and except to the extent that FTA determines otherwise in writing, the Recipient agrees to comply with the policies of Executive Order No. 13166, "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency," 42 U.S.C. § 2000d 1 note, and with the provisions of U.S. DOT Notice, "DOT Guidance to Recipients on Special Language Services to Limited English Proficient (LEP) Beneficiaries," 70 Fed.
